Dear parents and carers,

A very warm welcome to the new academic year especially to those who are joining our

Priory family for the first time. It has been so lovely to see all our children and families returning after the summer holidays and making such an incredibly positive start. The children also look very smart in their new uniforms.



Last year we were extremely fortunate to see some extremely good progress outcomes which is testimony to the hard work of the children but also the result of excellent partnerships between school and home. In order to be successful children need to be in school every day unless there are exceptional circumstances. Please support us to maximise the learning opportunities for your child by getting them to school on time. We have many first aid trained staff who are able to advise if your child feels ill during the school day.

Our site staff and contractors have been extremely busy over the summer holidays as you can see from the landscaping at the front, painting around the building, new gates, the near completion of the town wall and some internal restructuring to extend our 'POD'

We recognise that this is a worrying time for many families in our community given the current economic pressures that everyone is facing and for a considerable time now governors and school leaders have reflected on how we can ensure that all children access exciting learning opportunities without worrying about costs. Therefore we are currently continuing not charging for Breakfast Club or after school clubs. We have also been able to keep the cost of school meals the same.

We do not expect parents to provide costumes for events such as 'World Book Day' as this puts additional strain on family budgets. Please remember that we are here as a community resource and to help. If you are experiencing any hardship then please contact the school office to arrange an appointment to come in to school to talk to someone.

The arrangements for children being dropped off/collected from school are working well, but we ask that all parents/carers drop off and collect promptly and vacate the area swiftly.

We recognise that there are ongoing issues with traffic on the market place and want to ensure that everyone stays safe. We are working with our community to try and ease the situation at the busiest times and would like to thank you in advance for your cooperation with this.

But deliver us from evil.



School Uniform

It is lovely to see so many children returning to school, looking so smart in their new, comfortable school uniform.

IMPORTANT NOTICE:

Please ensure that skirts are **knee length**. The children spend time sitting and working in groups on the carpet area – short skirts are not appropriate as other children can see underwear. This can be embarrassing for the child wearing the skirt and other children too.



Black shoes or trainers (no markings, colours or lights)

The correct PE kit must also be worn to school on their PE day – Polo shirt /T-shirt, **plain** black shorts and black football socks. For colder weather children can wear **plain** black joggers and sweatshirt. These are very reasonable priced in the school range in major local supermarkets.

Black tracksuits can also be worn and should be logo, pattern and marking free.

Behaviour

Our motto from behaviour is

Ready, Respectful, Safe

School staff really appreciate parents support with developing good behaviours for learning. We understand that sometimes children find it difficult to make good choices but it is extremely important that school and carers work together to ensure that children receive a consistent message as to what is and isn't acceptable.

Our Behaviour Blueprint (displayed in every classroom and working area) shows our rules, our routines, our phrases, our behaviour steps. It shows how we manage moments and how we repair and rebuild relationships.



The importance of school attendance.

The DfE policy document entitles 'Working together to improve school attendance' states:

`Improving attendance is everyone's business'

Some pupils find it harder than others to attend school and therefore at all stages of improving attendance, schools and partners should work with pupils and parents to remove any barriers to attendance by building strong and trusting relationships and working together to put the right support in place.

Where parents decide to have their child registered at school, they have an additional legal duty to ensure their child attends that school regularly. This means their child must attend every day that the school is open, except in a small number of allowable circumstances such as being too ill to attend or being given permission for an absence in advance from the school.

wellbeing, and wider life
chances. The pupils with the
highest attainment at the
end of key stage 2 have
higher rates of attendance
over the key stage
compared to those with the
lowest attainment.

We strive, to ensure all children at St Nicholas Priory feel part of our family and successfully

make progress academically and socially.




Poppy and Lyla (who were two of the children who took part in the Summer Reading Challenge) receiving their prize.

The children have settled back into The Pod wonderfully, sharing some photos and stories of their summer break which was lovely to hear and see.




Our new room will soon be ready which will give the children more space to play and learn. We are all very excited to be able to start using the new space.
