News from Year 2

Policing in the Community

In December, Priory helped to set the neighbourhood policing priorities. The next priority setting meeting is Thursday 23rd February.

The following priorities were agreed at the last meeting in December 2022

North Yarmouth – Anti Social Behaviour in the Newtown area

Targeted engagements across the area including:

□ Patrols in Newtown who had been affected by Youth ASB, PC Smith worked alongside schools to help identify those involved and this resulted in 10 Acceptable Behaviour Contacts (ABC's) being issued.

• Various "pop-up" events including a safety talk with children at Northgate Primary School, joint patrols and engagement surgery with housing officer, engagement event at local supermarkets.



South Yarmouth- Anti Social Behaviour around the Middlegate stairwells focusing on Tolhouse Street

• Environmental Visual Audit conducted alongside Councillors, Norfolk Fire, and members of Great Yarmouth Borough Council

• Operation with plain clothed officers around all 36 Stairwells in Middlegate and Tolhouse street to tackle ASB reported. This resulted in 7 ASB letters being sent.
